Unit 1 – Greetings & Introductions

In this unit you will learn how to greet, farewell, and acknowledge people and respond; to ask how somebody is and respond; to introduce yourself and others and respond.

Ngā Kupu Hou (Vocabulary)

A. GREETINGS, FAREWELLS & ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

In Māori there are different ways of greeting people. This is dependent on various factors such as the occasion (formal or informal), who is being spoken to, how many people are being spoken to, who is leaving, who is staying and what time of day it is.

Greetings will usually be followed by a kiss and a hug or a handshake and hongi (pressing of noses and forehead together).

() As with English, when addressing someone in Māori, we use their name or a special term of address (some examples are shown below), but there is a twist. If the name is Māori and has two short vowels or less, or has one long vowel, then e is added before the name e.g. e Mere, e Mā. If the name has more than two short vowels, or has more than one long vowel, e is omitted e.g. Mereana, Māui. This is the same for terms of address e.g. e *whae, whāea*. Non Māori names do not take *e* e.g. Allan.
